

From the Pastor:

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I always wondered when in my life I'd outgrow presents at Christmas time. I'll be honest, I still love receiving a gift, even if it's only something small. If asked though, I'll rarely say if there's something I want. I'll say instead that time with family and friends is enough for me. Perhaps you don't care for presents anymore either. We all know how difficult it can be for families to gather around the holidays, especially if family is scattered in different cities or states.

Now, we all know that Christmas isn't about the presents under the tree. But our secular world loves turning holidays into materialistic events. How many presents you get. How big or expensive they are. To our world, there is so much anxiety about having everything be perfect. The perfect food, the perfect gifts, the perfectly clean house for family to come over for the gifts and food. It's exhausting. And even as much as we know this shouldn't be, we fall into it too sometimes.

This Advent and Christmas season, we'll be following our theme, "Saved through childbearing" (1 Timothy 2:15). We normally think of children as the burden of Christmas, having to buy toys and presents for them. Yet, we'll hear instead how God used the women of Scripture to bring about the baby to be placed into a manger. From Eve to Mary, countless generations of women gave birth to those who our Lord would use in his redemption of mankind.

Christmas may not be about *presents*. Rather, it's about *presence!* Why have Christians given gifts at Christmas? Is it not because God gave a gift to us? For so this child shall go from a wooden manger to a wooden cross. By a star is his birth made known and by a star (the sun) is his resurrection shown. So let us give thanks to God for the presence of Jesus and the birth by the virgin Mary. For so it was in such a lowly birth, God blessed us with the greatest present of all! One that we can now share with the whole world... the peace of Immanuel, God with us!


